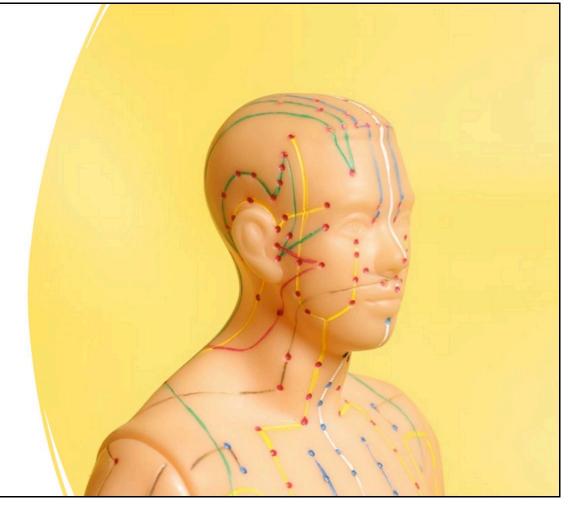
# INTRODUCTION OF AURICULAR MEDICINE

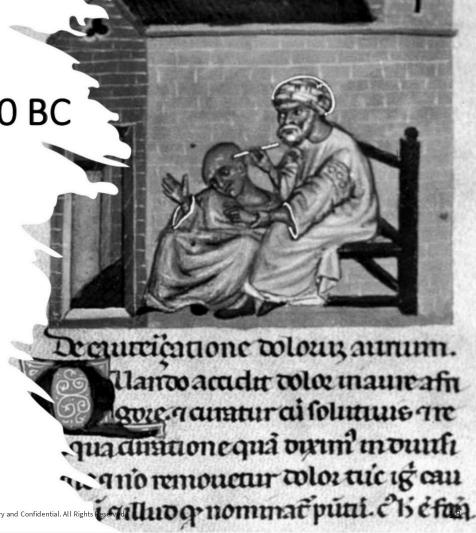

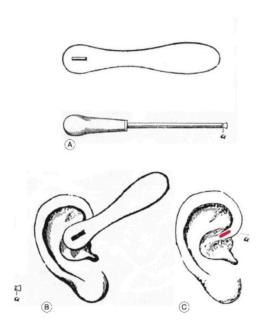
Introduction – Auricular History 460–380 BC

- Ancient Greece and Rome:
   Hippocrates and Galen recorded ear rings and and other form of ear stimulation for various problems.
- Ancient Persia: Recorded use of cauterization of the ear for sciatica treatment.
- Middle Ages in Europe: Recorded use of ear cauterization for neuralgia, toothaches, eye problems and sciatic pain.



#### **AURICULAR HISTORY UNVEILED: THE 1850 MILESTONE**

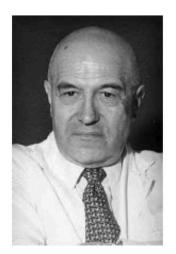
- The most crucial year for the development of contemporary ear acupuncture was 1850.
- French Journal des Connaissances Mé dico-Chirurgicales, in its issue of 1 May, published an article on the cauterization of the ear as a radical treatment for sciatica.
  - A female patient who had been suffering with sciatica for between 8 and 10 months.
  - She chose to be treated by a blacksmith who applied a red-hot iron to her outer ear to 'cut her sciatic nerve'. She recovered and after 20 days she was pain-free without relapse.



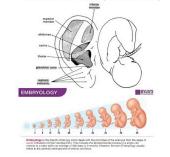


#### **AURICULAR THERAPY: FROM DISCOVERY TO MODERN PRACTICE**

- The years 1950-51 were important ones for the French physician Paul Nogier of Lyons (1908-1996)
- Nogier was impressed by the scar on the anthelix borne by some patients who had been treated for sciatica by healers in south-eastern France. Those patients got rapid recovery from pain within hours, or even minutes, after treatment.
- At first he applied cauterizations and later a less harmful method such as pins or acupuncture needles
- Nogier palpated and stimulated patients' auricles in order to relieve the different pain syndromes they presented.

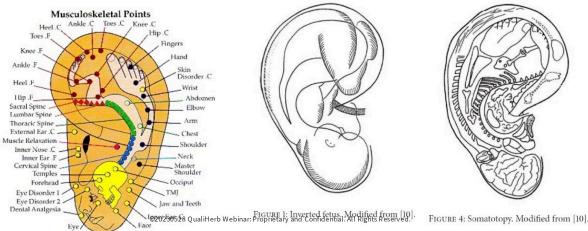

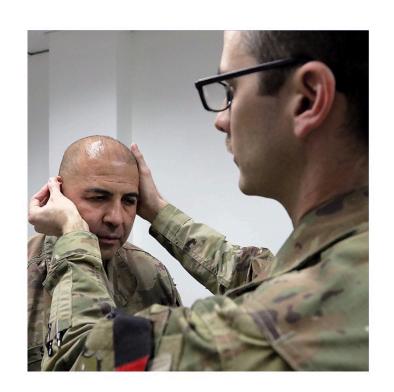
Battlefield acupuncture is a form of acupuncture developed by United States Air Force Colonel Dr. Richard Niemtzow in 2001, which is used to treat pain and other combat-related ailments. It involves the insertion of five small needles in specific points on the head and ear to stimulate energy flow, reducing pain and aiding recovery from injury.





During the Iraq and Afghanistan wars, a type of non-conventional therapy known as "battlefield acupuncture" (BFA) gained traction at Walter Reed Army Medical Center to treat the pain of wounded military men and women. "Western medicine was great for helping these patients but had its failures," BFA originator retired Air Force Col. Dr. Richard Niemtzow wrote in an essay in the journal Medical Acupuncture.





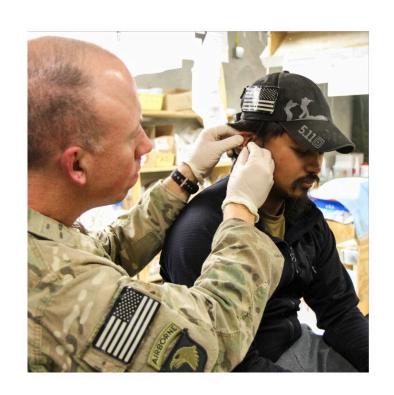
VA researchers have studied the therapy and published an article with their findings in the **August 2021** issue of the journal Pain Medicine. The article, titled "The Implementation and Effectiveness of Battlefield Auricular Acupuncture for Pain," discusses the promise and challenges of the approach.





Chronic (long-lasting) pain affects more than 50 million adults in the U.S., according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).





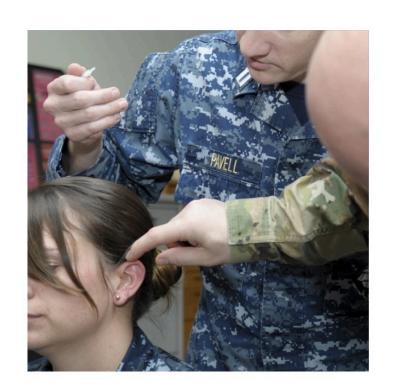
Medications have long been the mainstay of pain management. But these pharmaceuticals—including opioids, which are commonly prescribed for chronic pain—can be risky and have unwanted side effects. In reducing Veterans' pain while also lessening risk, VA offers battlefield acupuncture among other non-medication alternatives.





These points are believed to affect the entire body. The needles are meant to stay in the ears for several days. Precisely how the therapy works is unclear, but the needles may stimulate the central nervous system and reduce the sensation of pain by affecting parts of the brain such as the hypothalamus.





In the Pain Medicine article, BFA has been found to provide immediate, short-term reductions in pain for many. "It's not a longterm fix," Taylor emphasizes. "But for some people, it represents the first time in a long time they've had their pain reduced for even a moment."





The research found that a high proportion of patients benefited, with more than 75 percent of them reporting some immediate decrease in pain intensity after the treatment. In another study, a research team led by VA's Dr. Dan Federman looked at patients attending an in-demand VA battlefield acupuncture clinic. The investigators found a decrease in pain in 82% of patients, on average, including patients seen in group settings and those seen in individual settings.

#### PATIENT SELECTION



All non-pregnant patients 18 years of age or older, regardless of medications or diagnoses, may be considered for the BFA technique if they have:





an interest in receiving acupuncture treatment in the ear



ability to observe for the rare instance of inflammation



availability to follow up by phone or by visit



#### PATIENT SELECTION



#### Patients should NOT receive BFA if:



they are pregnant or might be pregnant



a bleeding disorder is present (



there is active infection present in an ear which is to be treated (treat only the uninfected ear)



current or previous keloid scar formation on the either ear

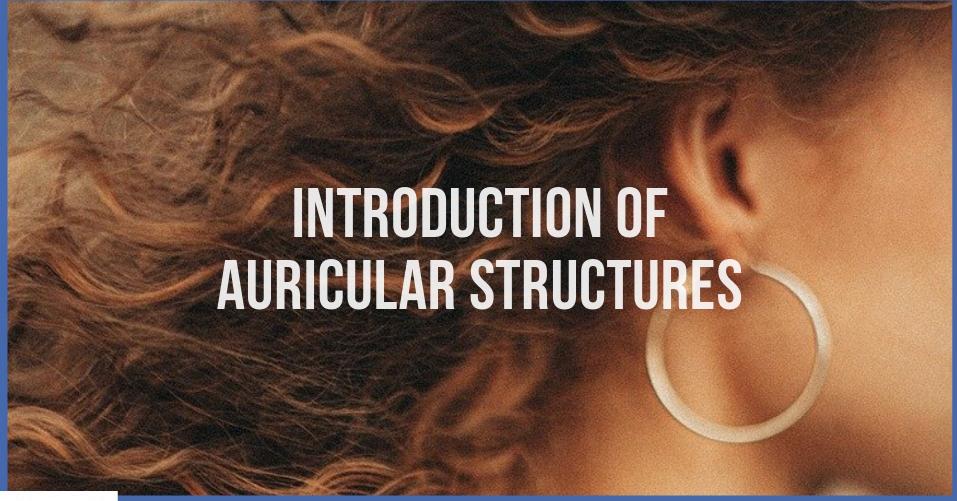


they have an aversion to needles or a vasovagal response to needle

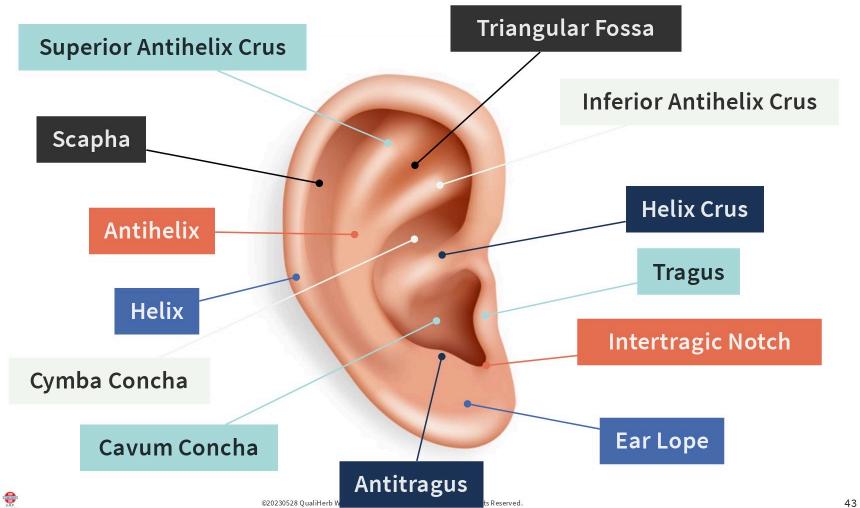

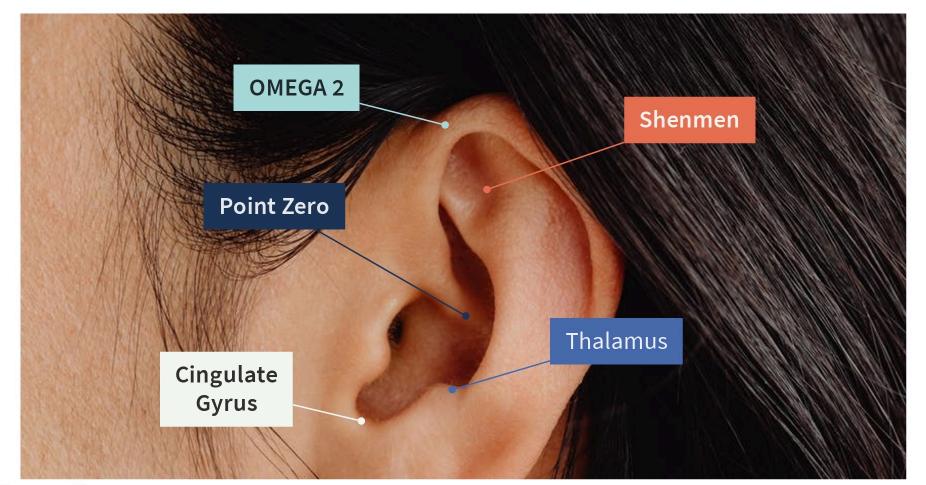

• **Cingulate Gyrus:** Part of the limbic lobe of the brain and is involved in processing emotion, learning and memory.

 Shenmen: Alleviates stress, pain, tension, anxiety, depression, insomnia, calms the mind.

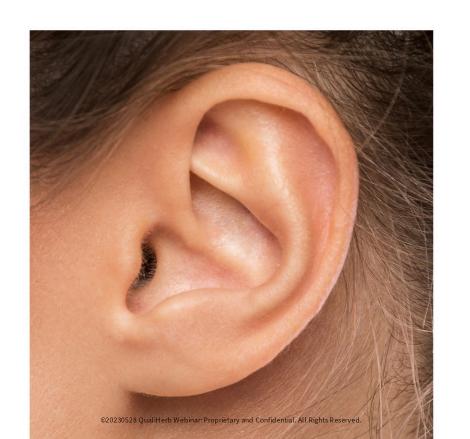
This Shenmen (神門) shares the same purpose as HT7, as they both possess very similar functions.

 Point Zero: General homeostatic balance; autonomic brain controls visceral organs.

Homeostatic balance is the process of maintaining a relatively stable internal environment within the body despite fluctuations in external conditions.























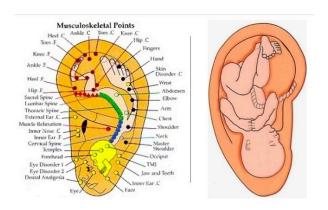

#### WHAT IS FANG JIA FANG?

Fang Jia Fang is the concept of using formulas like single herbs so that when you customize an herbal prescription you are adding formulas with formulas. The single herb ingredients in herbal formulas are decocted and extracted together so that the single herbs no longer retain their individual properties but have combined with all the other single herbs to create a unique formula that has its own specific properties and functions. When you then combine formulas together you are in essence adding the effects of each formula together and not the properties/functions of the single herbs within those formulas.

Tao Hong Si Wu Tang promotes blood circulation and dispels blood stasis. Si Ni San soothes the liver and relieves depression. When combined with Jie Geng, Chai Hu, and Zhi Ke, it is particularly effective in dispersing chest congestion. Niu Xi guides stagnant blood downward, facilitating the smooth flow of Qi and blood. This combination of **ascending** and **descending** actions helps to enhance the circulation of Qi and blood.

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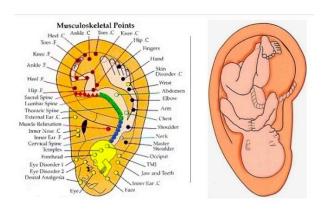
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
